
## Writing Task - Narrative

## Looking North

The Plough is the most easily recognised group of stars in the northern Manx sky. It is always above the horizon, it looks a bit like a saucepan, and the two stars furthest from the 'handle' end point towards the North Star, so you can always use it to help you find north. On the other side of Polaris from the Plough is the W-shaped constellation of Cassiopeia. The stars in the northern sky move around Polaris, and never set throughout the year, so you will always be able to find them on a clear night.

## Looking South

These stars change throughout the year, but you should see in autumn the stars of the square of Pegasus, and Andromeda. In winter the magnificent and unmistakable sight of Orion the hunter, Gemini (seen as two stick-figures), Sirius the brightest star in our sky, and the Pleiades or Seven Sisters. In spring the sky is dominated by Leo and Virgo and in the summer months the Summer Triangle, which features Cygnus the swan, and clearly visible on a dark moonless night our galaxy, the Milky Way which Cygnus appears to be flying down.
